# Kicking it into Gear

Any complicated machine relies on several individual parts to get the job done. When the system is overwhelming and complex as prostate cancer, there is more likelihood for the gears to get stuck and a man to get lost during the journey.

Calgary's Prostate Cancer Centre is a one-stop leading edge privately funded facility. We provide our community with rapid access to prostate awareness, information, diagnostic services, treatment and after care. A man could visit our Centre up to 60 times and each one of them for a different reason.

Most of all, we want to encourage men to kick the gears when they get stuck and experience the control they can have in their prostate cancer journey.

## Message from Board Chair and Executive Director

In early 2014 the Prostate Cancer Foundation (PCF) and Prostate Cancer Centre (PCC) decided that there was no longer any reason to have two Boards that were originally formed in 1999. In March of 2014 we became a single entity – PCC Prostate Cancer Centre.

The main purpose of the Prostate Cancer Centre is to provide an innovative and integrated approach to awareness, assessment, diagnosis, education, state of the art treatment, follow-up and support of men with prostate cancer in Calgary and Southern Alberta. Our world class, non-profit facility has become known for its one-stop leading edge services. This efficient model is only possible because of our strong partnerships with the Southern Alberta Institute of Urology, EFW radiologists, psychologists, nutritionists and physiologists. We also closely collaborate with the Rockyview Hospital and the Tom Baker Cancer Centre.

Through our many special fundraising and awareness events, in addition to the generous support of our corporate and personal donors, our Centre earned revenue of \$3.7 million in 2014. Coming together to support men with prostate cancer, many companies, individuals and families play a key role in raising both awareness and funding. A list of individuals and organizations who donated \$500 or more to our organization is appended to this report.

Over the last year, together with our partners, we have taken action to:

- Provide the best patient and family experience through our six Rapid Access clinics and wellness programs.

- Increase the number of early detection of prostate cancer clinics in Alberta through the Man Van™ program.
- Increase the number of research studies conducted at the Centre and build capacity to sustain our long term research projects.
- Develop comprehensive internal quality measures, accountability and safety performance indicators throughout the organization.

We want to thank our Directors for their dedication and personal time over the last year to assist in the direction of the organization. We say goodbye to Rob Jennings a Board member since 2001. His passion and wisdom have been evident in the years he served as both director and Chair of the Board. We also say goodbye to Jim Conroy who served since 2004. We are grateful for all of Rob and Jim's contributions as they have been essential to the success of the Prostate Cancer Centre. This year, we also say good bye to Susan Evans. Not only did Susan supply great governance, she and her husband Phil also established an endowment fund to ensure the long term financial stability of the Centre.

We welcome Maryse St. Laurent and Rick Lancaster to the Board as our newest Directors and we are sure they will play a large role in our success in coming years. We would like to thank all the volunteers and employees who have put in so many hours to help create the success of the Centre.

# A YEAR IN REVIEW

## MIKE WILSON ACTIVE SURVEILLANCE CLINIC

Agrium is known in the business world as one of the largest philanthropic organizations in North America. Over the years they have been a huge supporter of the Prostate Cancer Centre. When Mike Wilson announced his retirement from Agrium, they honoured him with a \$1 million gift to be designated to the charity of his choice. Using the same diligence and experienced decision making skills he has used throughout his business life, Mike Wilson investigated ways to invest these charitable dollars. He saw value in the active surveillance clinic (RAC 5) and directed his parting gift from Agrium to this worthwhile endeavour. In his usual unassuming way, Mike made this million dollar gift in his hometown so men will have access to the best medical care while delaying or avoiding unnecessary treatment.

## RAPID ACCESS CLINIC (RAC) 4



The RAC 4 clinic is specifically for patients who have been through prostate cancer surgery. These patients have follow up appointments at the 3 and 9 month post-surgery. They are assessed for continence and erectile function issues and referred to specialists as needed. In 2014 the RAC 4 clinic followed up with 362 patients at the post-surgery marks, and referred 420 patients to other programs offered at the Prostate Cancer Centre. The clinic has grown significantly since its start in September 2013, and we look forward to the continuing demand of the program next year.

## RESEARCH AT THE PCC



The Prostate Cancer Centre takes great pride in being involved in research to improve the diagnosis and treatment of prostate cancer patients. Our highly experienced research team continued its reputation for conducting research at the highest level of excellence. Although our primary area of research is prostate cancer, we continue to collaborate with the Urologists for research on other urological conditions. Over the past year, research patients continued their participation in clinical trials for interstitial cystitis, urinary stress incontinence, and testosterone deficiency. Contributions made to two projects aiming to better diagnose prostate cancer are particularly noteworthy.

The APCaRI project (Alberta Prostate Cancer Research Initiative) commenced participant recruitment in June 2014 and enrolled 155 patients making up 75% of the overall recruitment in Alberta. This project is of utmost importance as it aims to find new diagnostic tests which will reveal prostate cancer and identify those at higher risk for metastatic disease.

The Ultrasound Study (high resolution ultrasound versus standard low resolution ultrasound during prostate biopsy) finished the year off at a record recruitment pace, enrolling 304 patients. This is a significant contribution to this new technology focused

on better diagnosing prostate cancer.

In the area of treatment for prostate cancer, we launched the SPARTAN study for men with non-metastatic prostate cancer. This study will test an investigational drug in men who are at high risk of developing metastasis. Enrolment is currently ongoing.

Two additional treatment studies are currently in the preliminary stages with enrolment expected to commence in early 2015.

## ROAD TRIP TO SASKATCHEWAN




In September 2014, the Prostate Cancer Centre's (PCC) Combines for Cures™ initiative undertook a historic first. The rural MAN VAN™, ventured into Saskatchewan to provide Prostate Specific Antigen (PSA) blood tests to rural Saskatchewan communities, while educating men on the importance of early detection of prostate cancer. The trip was made possible by Combines For Cures sponsors, and hosted at Agrium's Crop Production Services (CPS) locations in Delisle and Biggar, and Richardson Pioneer terminals in Kindersley and North Battleford. The reception received by the participants was overwhelmingly positive, with everyone understanding the benefits of early prostate cancer detection.




## OUR MACHINE

Our machine consists of six primary gears and numerous tools that help it run. We offer our patients six Rapid Access Clinics (RAC). Each RAC addresses primary needs throughout the journey of prostate cancer.





## RAC 1 - ACCESS TO A SPECIALIST

These clinics are used to shorten wait times from a family doctor referral to a consultation with a urologist. These clinics are staffed by urologists who will determine if further investigation is required for the patient.




## RAC 2 - ACCESS TO TREATMENT SPECIALISTS

Bi-monthly information sessions are offered to men diagnosed with prostate cancer. The seminar format gives participants the opportunity to hear from a urologist, radiation oncologist and medical oncologist who explain prostate cancer, treatment options and their side effects. These bi-weekly sessions take place on Tuesday evenings at our Centre.




## RAC 3 - ACCESS TO POST-OP CARE

If a patient's treatment includes surgery at the Rockyview Hospital, follow-up care is offered from the Prostate Cancer Centre's post-op care nurse. The nurse is available to remove catheters, staples and provide information to post-op patients in person and by phone.



## RAC 4 - ACCESS TO SUPPORT FOR INCONTINENCE AND ERECTILE DYSFUNCTION

Patients who have had surgical treatment will be followed up by a nurse at the PCC for 3 month and 9 month post-op appointments. They will be assessed for continence and erectile issues and offered various treatments or referred to specialists if necessary. An Intimacy after Prostate Cancer Class for couples is a workshop offered four to five times a year followed by injection clinics if this is a treatment the patient wishes to pursue.




## RAC 5 - ACTIVE SURVEILLANCE

A clinic for patients who are currently diagnosed with prostate cancer but do not presently require treatment. They will be seen by a urologist for a DRE (digital rectal exam) and review of their PSA (prostate specific antigen) blood results. RAC 5 also runs a study with the Alberta Cancer Research Tumor Bank. Men are asked to participate by contributing a blood, urine and semen sample.

## RAC 6 - ANDROGEN DEPRIVATION THERAPY (ADT)

Patients who have advanced prostate cancer are often treated with Hormone Deprivation Therapy. The main androgen is testosterone. Lowering androgen levels or stopping them from getting into prostate cancer cells often makes prostate cancers shrink or grow at a slower rate for a period of time. A Urologist sees the patients for ADT injections and follow up. Also, there is a class offered to patients on androgen deprivation therapy.





## OUR PROGRAMS

In addition to our primary gears, we have numerous tools that help our machine run efficiently. Whether it is deciding which treatment is the right one, or help with incontinence and/or sexual issues, these tools help a man kick the gears into motion again.

## LIFE AFTER PROSTATE CANCER

This class provides wellness information for prostate cancer patients and their support persons. Presenters include a dietician, kinesiologist, physiotherapist, and psychologist.



## INTIMACY WORKSHOP

The Prostate Cancer Centre is pleased to offer an intimacy workshop for couples. Topics covered in the workshops include:

- How to understand your sexual values as a couple.
- How to have satisfying sex after treatment.
- Specific skills for maintaining satisfying sexual intimacy.


Workshops are offered approximately every eight weeks and are open to men who have received treatment for prostate cancer in the past five years.

## PELVIC PHYSIOTHERAPY

Patients with ongoing bladder control issues after prostate cancer treatments have the opportunity to be referred to a pelvic physiotherapist. The pelvic physiotherapist teaches the appropriate techniques for the pelvic floor exercises and ensures the patients are doing them correctly. Patients have the opportunity to see the therapist for two in house visits, and can continue treatment if needed.

## STRENGTH AND STRETCH

This class is provided by a certified exercise instructor and guides patients through gentle functional fitness, strength and stretching exercise specifically designed for prostate cancer patients.



## INJECTION CLINICS

Couples who have attended the intimacy workshop are eligible for injection therapy clinics. Clinics include education and personalized teaching on injection therapy for erectile dysfunction. Clinics are held approximately every eight weeks.

## THE MAN VAN PROGRAM

Our two MAN VANS are the wheels that transport our “Get Checked” motto to the community. They are out promoting awareness and encouraging men to take control of their health. We have two MAN VANS, to service both urban and rural men.

If you're a man over age 40, keep your eyes on the road in 2015 for the next stop the Man Van will make. A visit to the clinic is quick, easy and an effective first step to taking control of your health.
