The PCC's community of more than 2,780 donors are joining us in the fight against prostate cancer and advocating for men's health.

WE EXPANDED OUR FUNDRAISING POTENTIAL by putting together an ambitious plan that would help us expand our reach to include all of Alberta and help sustain our organization for decades to come.

WE INCREASED OUR GOVERNMENT RELATIONS efforts to advocate for equitable care for all men across the province. And we worked on strengthening and building partnerships across our suppliers, Alberta Health Services, sponsors, advocacy groups, and more.

WE INCREASED OUR STAFF COUNT. We believe the key to making these far-reaching positive changes is our people. Investing in our employees, researchers and volunteers gives us the edge to recruit and retain expert and passionate people who get the right things done in the most creative and long-lasting ways.

All of this work supports our sustainability and expansion plans, which includes expanding our in-person and online clinics and programs. Our physical space is growing, which will allow us to care for more men and add more mental health and pre-habilitation programming.

We want to empower men and make it easy to make decisions, get treatment and support, and successfully move on from their experience with cancer.

ON THE ROAD AGAIN

In June 2022, the **MAN VAN**[™] got back on the road after being closed during the height of the pandemic. We made up for lost time and travelled to as many areas as we could for the remainder of the year.

We hosted **83 CLINICS** across urban and rural Southern Alberta with an impressive **2,002 MEN** coming out to receive a PSA blood test.

Prostate cancer is a disease that usually doesn't show symptoms until there's significant progression. Our vans reach men, especially in **REMOTE AND VULNERABLE COMMUNITIES IN SOUTHERN ALBERTA**,

who otherwise may not have access to a PSA test. We help identify those at risk for advanced prostate cancer and educate men and their families about the importance of getting checked.

The MAN VAN™ is still Canada's first and only mobile men's health clinic offering free PSA blood testing used for early detection of prostate cancer in men aged 40-80 throughout Calgary and Southern Alberta. It's also the only mobile health clinic to conduct mental wellness checks.



IN THE DRIVER'S SEAT OF MEN'S HEALTH

As a retired firefighter of 32 years, I know all too well what it's like to find yourself being rushed into situations with complete uncertainty. When you get the call (emergency or prostate cancer diagnosis), you don't know what you're headed for or if you'll survive.

My involvement with the MAN VANTM started when I was Captain at Station 32 and we supported the PCC by storing one of the vans there.

Over the years, I met a lot of the drivers and my relationship with the PCC became very special. I wanted **TO FIND OTHER WAYS TO SUPPORT THE PROGRAM** and rallied with colleagues to have Seton fire station store the other MAN VANTM that was used in rural areas.

As firefighters, we put ourselves under grueling physical extremes and we're often so dedicated to saving the lives of others, we neglect to prioritize our own health. IT BECAME CLEAR HOW CRITICAL THIS PROGRAM IS TO THE MEN who don't take control of their health or who don't have access to healthcare.

I became a MAN VAN™ driver in 2015 after retirement and still truly appreciate the camaraderie and teamwork between the drivers, clinical staff and volunteers – it reminds me of the fellowship I experienced while serving on the department.

Men may be under-served in health care. The value of raising awareness and providing mobile clinics that service both urban and remote rural areas **CREATES A POSITIVE IMPACT ON MEN'S HEALTH** in Alberta. I've always been proud to be an Albertan and by working with Prostate Cancer Calgary, that pride has increased tenfold.

PATIENTCARE

While virtual care continued to play a key role in patient care last year – and will continue to for years to come – we were thrilled to welcome patients back in person to the Centre. Between virtual and in-person visits, **WE SUPPORTED**ALMOST 10,000 MEN WITH CONSULTATIONS, CLINICS, TREATMENT, EDUCATION, MENTAL HEALTH SUPPORT,

AND PRE- AND POST-OPERATIVE CARE.

In September 2022, we restarted in-person clinical programs. Our clinical team continued to provide innovative strategies such as **VIRTUAL GROUP SESSIONS**, **ENHANCED SAFETY PROTOCOLS** and **EFFICIENT PATIENT SCHEDULING** to adapt to the ever-changing healthcare environment.

We continued to listen to the needs of our patients and their families and developed the foundation for **EXPANDED PROGRAMMING, WHICH WE LOOK FORWARD TO IMPLEMENTING IN 2023.** This includes new clinical programs and technology in pre-habilitation and mental wellness to optimize a patient's post-operative experience.

Mental Wellness

Finding out you have cancer and may need lifechanging surgery can be overwhelming for many patients and their families. Mental health support is a critical component of complete cancer care.

In 2022, our clinical team held more than **30**PERSONAL INTERVIEWS WITH PATIENTS,
SPOUSES, CAREGIVERS AND FAMILY MEMBERS

on the effectiveness of our mental health programs; they confirmed the need to keep hosting and enhancing these programs.

In 2022, we developed a **PRE-HABILITATION PROGRAM DESIGNED TO EMPOWER MEN WITH THE KNOWLEDGE, TOOLS AND RESOURCES**

to improve their physical and mental health before under going treatment for prostate cancer. We focus on preventative measures and personalized care plans to meet each patient's unique needs.

Pre-habilitation

Pre-habilitation programs - for example in exercise, nutrition and mental health - are proven to **IMPROVE**A PATIENT'S EXPERIENCE AND REDUCE POSTTREATMENT COMPLICATIONS. This style of personalized prescriptive care is not a standard model of care for prostate cancer patients.


RESEARCH HIGHLIGHTS

Global pharmaceutical trial

The PCC began participating in a **GLOBAL RESEARCH DRUG TRIAL WITH PATIENTS WHO HAVE METASTATIC CASTRATION-SENSITIVE PROSTATE CANCER WITH A GENE MUTATION.**

This cancer spreads to other parts of the body other than the prostate gland but can still be managed with hormonal treatments that reduces testosterone. The study will test whether combining two drugs (talazoparib and enzalutamide) is more effective in reducing tumor size or slowing tumor growth.





Complex kidney cysts

Approximately **35 PATIENTS ARE PARTICIPATING IN A RESEARCH STUDY** to determine if patients living with **COMPLEX KIDNEY CYSTS** should continue with active surveillance or have them surgically removed. With new data showing that a large number of these cysts are removed even though they are benign or not aggressive, active surveillance may be the better – and less-invasive treatment option, resulting in fewer unnecessary surgeries and better patient outcomes.

Genitourinary cancer genomics

Genitourinary (GU) oncology focuses on cancers found in the urinary system and the male reproductive system. **DR. TAREK A. BISMAR IS INVESTIGATING THE MOLECULAR BACKGROUND OF GU CANCERS**. When we know what gene is associated with a patient's cancer, we can then give them a particular drug and treatment option that will be the most effective.



Alberta Prostate Cancer Research Initiative (APCaRI) registry

The PCC continues to make progress to recruit patients to the APCaRI registry. At the end of 2022, **WE REACHED AN ENROLLMENT OF 1,800 PATIENTS.** We improved our recruitment strategies, enhanced engagement with patients and their families, and leveraged new technologies to make it easier for patients to participate.

APCaRI brings together a multi-disciplinary team of prostate cancer scientists, physicians, patients and other professionals who work together to

SPEED UP THE DELIVERY OF NEW RESEARCH IDEAS FROM THE LABORATORY TO THE CLINIC.

The registry monitors the patterns of care and outcomes of men diagnosed with prostate cancer throughout Alberta.

In 2022, Nanostics, an Edmonton-based medical device and biotechnology company, received approval to market and sell their ClarityDX Prostate® test in Europe and is seeking approval in North America.

This new blood test is expected to be more accurate in detecting prostate cancer. Results from clinical trials showed a **40% INCREASE IN ACCURACY** over the current PSA testing. We're proud to report that our contributions to APCaRI's registry and helped make this happen.

EVENTS & FUNDRAISING

We were thrilled to connect again, inperson, with our supporters for fun, food and festivities at our events. Despite still being in a pandemic, people came out to eat, golf, laugh, ride, and run in their underwear. We were so **GRATEFUL TO COME TOGETHER AND CELEBRATE** in support of men's health and the fight against prostate cancer.

At the 4th annual event of stand-up comedy performances, the crowd brought belly laughs and bucks to help raise awareness about men's health and prostate cancer.

At the 15th annual golf tournament, guests and sponsors raised a remarkable amount with proceeds going directly to the PCC. Since the tournament started, the Classic remains a critical fundraising event for PCC.

Almost 200 guests attended the inaugural event that featured a wellness fair. The theme focused on the importance of mental health and taking care of your health at every age.

Marco Carducci, age 25 and goalkeeper for the Canadian Premier League Cavalry Football Club, spoke about his testicular cancer experience, putting a spotlight on the importance of early detection.

Blair Ector, a successful criminal defense lawyer, shared his story of childhood physical and mental trauma, substance use, and how he survived because of his family and the resources available.



RIDE FOR DAD

Every year across the country, thousands of participants, supporters and friends hop on their bikes at the annual Motorcycle Ride for Dad in support of the Prostate Cancer Fight Foundation.

All funds raised stay local. The Calgary chapter has been supporting the PCC since 2008 raising more than \$675,000 for prostate cancer research, the MAN VAN™ and clinical care.

Bikers ride the distance for all kinds of reasons – in honour of a loved one who passed from prostate cancer or another type of cancer, or to help raise awareness of the importance of getting checked. It's run by dedicated volunteers who organize community fundraising events and rally sponsors and participants.

Year after year, riders consistently show up and donate in support of men's health. The loyalty and miles add up – continuing to pave the way for the PCC to deliver exceptional care for men and their families.

Keep it in Alberta Campaign

Our Keep it in Alberta Campaign ran in November and **RAISED NEARLY \$210,000.** Donations to this campaign make sure that **EVERY DOLLAR RAISED SUPPORTS THE MEN IN OUR COMMUNITY.**
