On behalf of the Prostate Cancer Foundation's Board of Directors, I am pleased to report on our organization's accomplishments for 2010. As a Foundation, our primary role is to raise, direct and administer funds to combat prostate cancer and prostate-related disease. The Foundation provides financial support for research, awareness and education initiatives that advance the knowledge of prostate cancer treatment and prevention.

Looking back, 2010 was a pivotal year for our Foundation. In April, the Prostate Cancer Centre opened in its new home in the new Southern Alberta Institute of Urology at the Rockyview Hospital. This unique project was completed entirely through the generosity of local philanthropists, the Calgary Health Trust and our Foundation.

Last year's various initiatives included a number of community awareness and fundraising events and we kicked off the move to our new home with our annual stampede breakfast cooking for over 2000 people.

Letter from the Prostate Cancer Centre Chairman

With the aim of "one stop shopping" in mind, the Prostate Cancer Centre has four major roles: our amazing volunteers and staff assist newly diagnosed men and their families with the journey through prostate cancer treatment; medical professionals provide diagnostic and treatment information; we facilitate early diagnosis, treatment and after-care; and our Centre conducts clinical research focused on prostate canprostate-related diseases. and cer

The foundation of the Centre is our three Rapid Access Clinics. Rapid Access 1 is a streamlined process of initial testing and diagnosis of prostate cancer enabling quicker access medical practice. to treatment. Rapid Access

2 offers diagnosed patients and their partners "in house" information sessions hosted by medical professionals who outline treatment options and potential side effects.

In 2010 we piloted Phase 3 of the Rapid Access Clinics and in 2011 we are making Rapid Access Clinic 3 fully operational. This clinic extends our patient care and furthers our relationship with the patient and his family. Rapid Access Clinic 3 is the post-operative follow up care for men who have received treatment for prostate cancer, by a nurse here at the Prostate Cancer Centre. This has greatly reduced patient visits to emergency and has provided patients with personalized care throughout their surgical stay. After surgery, this nurse also enrolls patients in our various wellness and sexuality clinics.

The Prostate Cancer Centre also conducts prostate cancer-related research and participates in international clinical trials. We work closely with the Rockyview General Hospital and the Tom Baker Cancer Centre. The Research Department of the Prostate Cancer Centre has been operating since the Centre opened in 1999. Our research team, consisting of twelve urologists and two registered nurses has been involved in multiple national and international studies. We currently have a well established Clinical Trials department at the Prostate Cancer Centre. Over the past 11 years hundreds of participants have been involved in many world class studies that have worked towards the prevention and treatment of many cancers and urological disorders.

The ability to conduct clinical trials is greatly facilitated by the fact that all urologists in Calgary are at the Southern Alberta Institute of Urology. This provides access to a broad

local patient population as well as world class medical resources which create an environment that allows for cutting edge research and treatment options.

Findings from raw research data are taken and translated into meaningful medical practice. We are pleased to have Dr. Tarek Bismar join us and bring his expertise in genetic research to the Center. Dr. Bismar is a genitourinary pathologist with a special and active interest in prostate cancer research. He has fellowship training in genitourinary pathology from Wayne State and Harvard University. Dr. Bismar's research on gene fusions in prostate cancer is changing the way we think about this disease.

I would like to thank the Board Directors for their efforts to help the Centre achieve its current status in the community. In October 2010 the Centre's Executive Director, Tom Kenny, retired to pursue other interests and we wish him well in his new endeavors. Pam Heard was appointed to the position November 2010 and along with the excellent staff at our Centre our operations are always on track.

Your support, along with longtime partners and donors, will fund the Centre and a growing number of promising research projects. You can help spark new advancements that improve health and increase hope. I extend my deep appreciation to those of you who have contributed to the achievement of our vision.

Southern Alberta Institue of Urology The 40,000 square-foot Southern Al-

The 40,000 square-foot Southern Alberta Urology Centre consolidates diagnostic and treatment facilities for a variety of common conditions, including prostate, bladder and kidney cancer, kidney stones, urinary tract problems, and incontinence.

The new institute consolidates Calgary's 14 urologists and the Prostate Cancer Centre on the Rockyview General Hospital site, where inpatient urology is centred. More than 700 patients a month use the new facility. The Institute was officially opened in September, 2010.

This \$26.5 million Institute is funded by a \$10-million cornerstone donation from Daryl (Doc) Seaman and W. Brett Wilson. Both men suffered from prostate cancer and contributed \$5 million each to bring this Institute to Southern Alberta. The rest of the money came from very generous community donors. The Prostate Cancer Centre is located at the Southern Alberta Institute of Urology.

Message from the Executive Director



It is a great privilege to be the Executive Director of the Prostate Cancer Centre. I came to the Centre in November 2010 and quickly realized that I was working in a Centre of excellence. This was a year of significant change for the Prostate Cancer Centre. In April we moved into our brand new home within the Southern Alberta Institute of Urology (SAIU) across from the Rockyview Hospital. The 40,000 square-foot Southern Alberta Urology Centre consolidates diagnostic and treatment facilities for a variety of urological conditions. SAIU is the largest and most comprehensive urology centre in Canada and the first to offer a multidisciplinary, patientcentred approach to urological care.

The main purpose of the Prostate Cancer Centre is to provide an innovative and integrated approach to awareness, assessment, diagnosis, education, state of the art treatment, follow-up and support of men with prostate cancer in Calgary. Our world class, non-profit facility has become known for its one-stop leading edge services. Over 10,000 men and their families visit the Prostate Cancer Centre every year.

In 2010, prostate cancer took the lives of more than 400 fathers, brothers, uncles and husbands in Alberta. With approximately 2,400 new cases diagnosed in Alberta each year, prostate cancer is the most frequently diagnosed cancer in men in the province. Prostate cancer is one of the most treatable cancers if diagnosed early. Early detection of prostate cancer enhances survival thus underscoring the importance of reducing wait times from detection to treatment.

The Prostate Cancer Centre's three Rapid Access Clinics operate in conjunction with the Southern Alberta Institute of Urology to expedite appointments for examination and diagnosis and to review treatment options. Thanks to the very generous three year gift from the Canada Safeway Foundation in 2009, a great deal has been accomplished. Safeway's support of Rapid Access Clinic 1 and Rapid Access Clinic 2 has had a major impact on men suspected of or having prostate cancer. Prior to opening our Rapid Access Clinic 1 in September, 2005 wait times for diagnosis were as long as three months. The operation of our clinic has reduced these times to 8.5 days. Last year over 1400 patients were seen through the Rapid Access Clinics.

The Resource Centre is the heart of the Prostate Cancer Centre. Our key resource is our volunteers – men who have had prostate cancer, their spouses and other committed individuals. Our volunteers provide knowledgeable, compassionate and supportive listening to people needing someone to talk to. The volunteers – prostate cancer "graduates" - also help people access information from books, journals, videos and selected internet sites. Never in my career have I ever seen such dedication, commitment and passion from the volunteers who staff our resource centre and our Man Van[™].

The Man Van[™] is the first and only mobile PSA testing unit in Canada and has been on the streets of Calgary since June 2009. The Centre uses the Man Van[™] to help further our mission of eliminating advanced prostate cancer through increased awareness about the early detection of prostate cancer. On average, the Man Van[™] tests 2000 men a year, saving countless lives.

Our EFW Radiology partners are a pleasure to work with and continue EFW Radiology continued to conduct biopsies on average two days a week at the Centre. This service is unique because the staff and volunteers of the Centre provide support for patients and their families before, during and after their procedure.

The Boards of the Prostate Cancer Centre and Foundation have offered me invaluable advice and support and their dedication of time to the Prostate Cancer Centre is truly astounding. My Journey

"I never ever thought that I would get cancer, there was no family history. I believed that I was bullet proof even at my tender age.

Thank God over the years I made an effort to have an annual check up which most fortunately included a PSA test, what the heck I was having blood work done as part of my annual check up so why not have the doctor check the box to include for a PSA test. I'm very grateful that my family doctor included this test as part of my normal annual check-up since I turned 50.

Last April 2010, my family doctor phoned my home to advise me that he wanted to discuss my results, I thought nothing of it at that moment until he told me when I met him at his office that my PSA had spiked and he was going to arrange for me to have further testing at the Prostate Cancer Centre, I was stunned, in fact after he said the word – cancer- I could have been knocked over by a light breeze. The thing about prostate cancer is that there are no early symptoms, no pain, no sores or a rash or anything that your body tells you that there is a problem until it is too late and it has advanced; Prostate cancer is the most common cancer among men and by far the most treatable if it is caught early, there-in the probability for a positive outcome are better than 90%, in fact my doctor would say better than 98%.

So I have the physical exam at the PCC and I'm told that they don't like the feel of my prostate and that the next step is to have a biopsy. I'm now in complete panic mode and can not sleep at all. In June, I have the biopsy and 3 weeks later I'm told I have prostate cancer. Thank God my wife was with me and the doctor because I don't hear a word after "Wayne you have cancer"... After a few minutes I'm composed and thank god that I had had the yearly PSA testing because the next thing that the doctor tells me is that I have been diagnosed a the very early stages (stage 1) of this type of cancer and as a result I could expect to have a very good outcome with surgery.

In October, I have the surgery,(I opted for the radical prostatectomy) and the results of the surgery were very positive and the long term outlook for me is promising, I was very fortunate by having been diagnosed very early on..

I do not want to think of what or where I would be today had I not had regular check-ups with PSA tests. For any fellow over the age of 40, a simple blood test on a regular basis is the right thing to do.

I was, and remain very grateful for the efforts and support I received from the entire medical team at the PCC and Rocky View hospital that I had to give something back, so I 'm now a volunteer host with the Man Van[™].

The Prostate Cancer Centre has some key goals for the next 3-4 years:

- Significantly increase the number of men in Southern Alberta who are over the age of 40 to have a baseline PSA test
- Enhance local health care professionals' knowledge, skills and practices in prostate cancer prevention, testing, diagnosis, treatment, rehabilitation and support
- Increase utilization of the Prostate Cancer Centre by southern Albertans
- Enhance and facilitate quality research
- Increase private and corporate funding to sustain and build the Prostate Cancer Centre

Some of the ways we will achieve these goals are:

- Determine our unique or higher-quality services at our centre and how to effectively collaborate to provide comprehensive patient-focused services
- Increase prostate awareness in the community and develop a regional PSA mobile testing program around the MAN VAN[™]
- Reach out to physicians particularly those that impact referral patterns
- Invest in translational medicine to optimize patient care and prevention
- Increase our donor and volunteer base




